

The Hagerty Lecture



The Hagerty Lecture speaker is Mike Nowatzki. Mike Nowatzki has served as communications director for the Office of the Governor since Gov. Doug Burgum took office in

December 2016. A native of Edinburg, N.D., Nowatzki earned a bachelor's degree in journalism with a minor in psychology from the University of North Dakota in Grand Forks. He worked in the newspaper industry for more than 18 years in North Dakota and Minnesota as a reporter for Forum Communications Co., covering a variety of beats including government, agriculture, business, criminal justice and higher education. Prior to joining the Governor's Office, he covered state government and the Legislature in Bismarck. As communications director, Nowatzki serves as the governor's spokesman and the media's primary point of contact with the Governor's Office, in addition to coordinating communications among the administration's 19 cabinet agencies. He and his wife, Jamie, live in Bismarck with their two daughters. In his spare time, he enjoys reading, coaching, music and pretending to know how to fish. The title of Hagerty Lecture is "Just the facts: Observations from the 'dark side' on the demise of objectivity in journalism."




Spectacular Students & Incredible Interns


interned at Special Olympics North Dakota as their Special

Dr. Joonghwa Lee, Associate Professor of Communication, shared his wealth of knowledge and what drives his vision in a recent interview with Kyra Younce, a Communication major and Outreach Specialist Intern for the Department. Holding a M.A. in advertising from Michigan State University,

and a Ph.D. in Journalism from Missouri School of Journalism, Dr. Lee's academic journey has been marked by commitment to both research and teaching. Dr. Lee was recently elected as the 2024-2025 Secretary of the American Academy of Advertising, which is one of the oldest and most prestigious organizations in strategic communication.

Apart from his role as an educator, Dr. Lee is actively involved in research on a multitude of topics. His work explores the role of interactive and non-traditional media in strategic communication, such as native advertising, social media, online videos, and games. Currently expanding his interest to the realm of social media influencer and media literacy, Dr. Lee continues to contribute to the scholarship and communication practices.

Dr. Lee's dedication extends beyond research and teaching. He plays an important role in creating opportunities for students in many ways. In summer 2024, Dr. Lee will hold a Digital Media Storytelling Camp, which is jointly funded by the North Dakota Newspaper Association Education Foundation and the UND College of Arts and Sciences. It is for 50 high school students where they would work directly with a local client and undergraduate students to develop creative stories. Dr. Lee shares his excitement in that "I have thought about this digital media storytelling camp over two years, so it has been one of my biggest dreams. We would like to help students especially around rural areas to have a better education about how to find and develop good stories and how to deliver those stories through digital media. There are a lot of digital platforms, social media, and different types of visuals. Some high school students may not be familiar with how to find good stories and how to share those stories on different digital media platforms."

Dr. Lee is also the faculty advisor of the UND Korean Culture Exchange Club where he works with students to host engaging cultural events, such as the Feel of Korea which was sponsored by the Consulate General of the Republic of Korea in Chicago. On top of these efforts, Dr. Lee is the chair of the Centennial Event Planning Committee and has been working tirelessly for a successful event, scheduled for April 25, 2024. He anticipates that "the centennial celebration will be one of the biggest milestones for our department."

In reflection of his journey, Dr. Lee shared a personal connection to academia, inspired by his late father, also a professor. The profound impact of seeing his father's former students publish his unfinished work fueled Dr. Lee's commitment to education and displayed the impact a professor has on their students. "It was a big moment that made me think about the meaning of his job as a professor and his relationship with his students. After seeing this, I decided in my mind to become a professor carrying on my father's legacy," Dr. Lee said.

His advice to students echoes his own experiences, encouraging them "not to limit yourself, recognize the multitude of opportunities within communication, and keep envisioning your dreams." Dr. Lee's story unfolds as that of a dedicated educator, researcher, and mentor, shaping the future of communication students at the University of North Dakota.



Public Information Basics Course L0105 Reflection

From the Editor: A Communication senior, Matthew Hjelmstad, had an opportunity to attend the L0105 Public Information Basics Course in Bismarck, ND in July 2023. The purpose of the Public Information Basics Course is to equip participants with the basic skills needed to be full- or part-time Public Information Officers (POIs), including oral or written communication, media relations, and basic tools and techniques to perform effectively as a PIO, both in the proactive/advocacy times and crisis/ emergency response. Hjelmstad shared key takeaways from the course.



The Public Information Basics Course that I attended on behalf of the University of North Dakota's Communication Department was a tremendous opportunity and an invaluable learning experience. As a communication major, I believe this course provided

knowledge and skills to navigate and manage crises effectively and efficiently and would be a useful resource for communication students at UND looking to find a career in crisis communication. This course also helped develop professionalism and gave an opportunity to network and relationship build. In this reflection, I will discuss key takeaways from the course material and provide additional comments and observations.

Takeaways

The PIOs are communicators. They disseminate information to the public by telling them what happened, what is being done about it, and what they should do. Public information is provided before, during, and after incidents. It is focused on communicating life and health saving information, including severity of situations and action steps that individuals and communities should have. The whole community has the right to know and the need to know. The role of public information is to empower the people to make the right decision at the right time.

The main function of a PIO is to get the right information to the right people at the right time so they can make the right decision. They must plan, be prepared for crisis situations, and maximize media exposure for their organization. PIOs use an ongoing cycle when getting information to the public. This cycle consists of (1) gathering, (2) verifying, (3) coordinating, and (4) disseminating information. Day-to-day tasks of a PIO make up 95% of their occupation. Examples of these tasks include planning and

accompanying an agency director to community events, updating media lists to include social media handles, or planning and executing a hurricane preparedness campaign. The remaining 5% of a PIO's occupation are incident tasks. Examples of incident tasks include set-up staff and activate media briefing room, prepare director to conduct news briefing on hurricane preparations, tweet hurricane shelter location information, monitor reporters' twitter handles, or issue hurricane evacuation instructions.

A PIO uses strategic communication planning to develop public awareness campaign key messages and incident communication strategies. Strategic communication planning can be completed using the 8-Step Communication Model, consisting of the following phases: (1) assess the situation, (2) set communication goals, (3) identify intended audiences, (4) develop and pretest messages, (5) select channels and activities, (6) develop an action plan, (7) develop and pretest materials, and (8) implement, evaluate, and modify plan.



Interview skills for a PIO are crucial, as providing information to the public often can be done through them. Developing a message that achieves the objective, given the

audience and medium, is accomplished through understanding the topic, developing key talking points, and practice/preparation. Nonverbal communication is also a vital component of interviews. Eye contact, tone of voice, facial expression, body positions/gestures, and attire are all factors to consider.

News conference responsibilities such as organizing and managing the conference and preparing the primary spokesperson are assumed by a PIO. The news conference cycle from the perspective of a PIO is



preparing, opening, closing, and following up. Working with media and developing relationships with reporters can be helpful for a PIO to build credibility.



Crisis/Emergency Communication is one of the most important roles a PIO possesses. Preparedness is key when dealing with a crisis event. This course highlighted the

significance of conducting risk assessments, scenario planning, and establishing communication channels in advance to ensure readiness during challenging times. Another vital aspect emphasized throughout the course was the significance of timely and transparent communication. During a crisis, it is imperative to provide accurate and up-to-date information promptly. Establishing designated spokespersons and developing consistent messaging are essential in conveying information effectively while maintaining credibility and trust.

In today's digital age, social media plays a significant role in crisis communication. The course emphasized the need to actively monitor social media platforms, engage in timely responses, and dispel/mitigate misinformation. Utilizing digital tools and platforms effectively, such as online newsrooms or dedicated crisis communication channels,

can enhance an organization's ability to disseminate information swiftly and maintain control over the narrative during a crisis. The "Golden Hour" is a rule that states a communication plan should be implemented within one hour of the crisis occurring. Social media can be a useful tool to disseminate that communication plan to the public.

A Joint Information System (JIS) serves as a crucial method for effective operation during incidents, providing coordination and ensuring the delivery of timely, accurate, accessible, and consistent messaging. It allows participating organizations to maintain their individual autonomy and responsibilities while working together. A JIC acts as a central hub that facilitates the JIS, offering a centralized location to streamline operations during and after an incident. By enhancing information coordination, minimizing misinformation, and maximizing resources, a JIC supports the overarching goal of the JIS: to deliver a unified message with a single voice.

Conclusion

Attending the Basic Public Information Course has been a transformative experience, equipping me with the knowledge and skills necessary to handle communication challenges as a PIO. This 3-day course developed my professionalism and allowed me to network and foster valuable relationships with crisis communication professionals. I am grateful for the opportunity to learn and grow in this vital area of communication.

ARCTEK2's research and technological innovation will assist CRREL in better understanding changes in Alaskan permafrost – the frozen layer of rock and soil that covers a significant amount of land above the Arctic Circle. Dr. Pasch and his team's tasks include conducting research fieldwork in the air and on the ground in some of the most remote and inaccessible regions of the Alaskan Arctic wilderness. This data is then analyzed through cutting-edge collaborative research in data



visualization, advanced modeling, and predictive analytics.


September and October and completed the academy on October 24, 2023.

Robb Jeffries ('12) I founded JK Vending, providing vending services in the Twin Cities area.




