His teaching responsibilities will include Human Geography, Economic Geography, Conservation of Resources, Regional Geography: China, Introduction to GIS, and Selected Topics in Economic Geography. Enru will play a key role in our community and urban development track, and the University's growing China initiative.

Dr. Douglas Munski received the regional 2006 National Faculty Service Award from the University Continuing Education Association for his work in continuing education, and then received the national award to boot! Our undergraduate majors and graduate students have been extremely successful securing summer internship and cooperative education opportunities. We plan to advertise next year for an open position to teach cartography, GIS, human geography, and urban geography and planning, as this year's search was not successful.

UND Geography hosts Great Plains/Rocky Mountain Division Meeting Sept. 12-13, 2008

UND Geography will host the 2008 Annual Meeting of the Great Plains/Rocky Mountain Division of the Association of American Geographers on Sept. 12-13, 2008. On Sept. 12, UND faculty will lead participants on field trips to local/regional places of interest. The meeting itself will be on Sept. 13 in the Memorial Union and will feature poster and paper presentations, a noon banquet with a keynote speaker, and a geobowl competition. This is an opportunity for UND Geography to showcase the department, university, city, and state. The meeting potentially will include geographers from Utah, Colorado, Kansas, Wyoming, Nebraska, Montana, South Dakota, and North Dakota, as well as West Lakes Division members from Minnesota and our colleagues affiliated with the Prairie Division of the Canadian Association of Geographers. We have secured some funding from UND administration, but we are requesting donations from alumni and friends of the department to help offset miscellaneous costs associated with holding a successful meeting. Geography Faculty and Staff Activities

Dr. Devon Hansen continues to be busy with teaching, research, and service activities. This past year she enjoyed teaching a wide variety of courses, including a community development course that incorporated a service learning component assisting the community of Larimore, ND. Professional travel took her to the CAG/PD regional meeting in Rugby, ND and at the AAG national meeting in San Francisco, CA. She advised a completed thesis project on aging in place in North Dakota. She is currently conducting research regarding population changes across the state of North Dakota as the baby-boom generation ages into retirement.

Dr. Douglas Munski continues to emphasize service to the department, the university, and the state of North Dakota as well as successfully maintaining an above-average teaching load for the campus. His 2006-07 academic year included being recognized by the University Continuing Education Association's national excellence in teaching award. Obviously, his work as the department's graduate director and senior-most undergraduate academic advisor are his most productive and intrinsically satisfying efforts as a professor.

Dr. Brad Rundquist keeps busy with the on-campus and on-line GIS programs, which continue to grow. He had two master's advisees finish this year (Scott Abel and Lisa Kuchy) and he published the 20th refereed paper of his career (with former student David Brookman). One of his former advisees, Charles Geraci, won the 2006 UND Graduate School's Distinguished Thesis Award. Dr. Rundquist is the Vice Chair of the Great Plains/Rocky Mountain Division of the AAG, and he will be Chair next year. He is also the book review editor for *Photogrammetric Engineering & Remote Sensing*. Ella, who is 5, keeps us busy with dance, soccer, and other activities. She is anxious to start kindergarten. Kristen continues to enjoy her work as the natural resources manager at the GFAFB. She was named the outstanding program manager last year.

Dr. Paul Todhunter gave two presentations at the CAG/PD Meeting in Rugby, and the GP/RMD Meeting in Lincoln, NE. He is currently revising, writing, or working on papers about wetland flooding in Nelson County (ND), flood flow frequency of the Red River of the North River, snow cover control of winter soil temperatures in the Great Plains, and the nature of seasonally frozen soils at Fargo. Next year will be his lame-duck year as Chair, and he anticipates taking a developmental leave ASAP after that time to gear up for a more active teaching role. Time spent outside UND continues to focus on the activities of his four college/high school/middle school age children.

Dr. Gregory Vandenberg is completing his third year at UND. He presented and/or co-authored several papers at professional meetings including the CAG Prairie Division, GPRM

AAG, and the Billings Reclamation Symposium. He also published a symposium paper on modeling heavy metals in streams with Charles Martin and Gary Pierzynski of Kansas State University. Dr. Vandenberg helped graduate his first masters degree student (Josh Johnston) in December 2006. He also developed three new courses this year: an online GIS course; a hydrology field methods course (with Dr. Phil Gerla in Geology); and a Great Plains physiography course.

In his first year as a tenure-track assistant professor, **Dr. Enru Wang** was busy with teaching and research. This past year he taught five courses, including Economic Geography, Conservation of Resources, Introduction to GIS, Regional Geography of China, and Selected Topics in Economic Geography. He was revising manuscripts based on his dissertation and also gave a presentation at the Annual Meeting of the Association of American Geographers in San Francisco. He looks forward to the trip to China on May 16 and the presentation to be given at the Second Global Conference on Economic Geography in Beijing. Dr. Wang worked as the faculty advisor for the UND International Organization, and helped students organize the 45th Annual Feast of Nations in February. He, and wife Juan, enjoy every minute spent with their daughter, Aurora, who is about 19 months old now.

Dr. Mohammad Hemmasi retired from UND in 2004 and settled in Normal, Illinois, where he is an adjunct professor at the Illinois State University. His half-time appointment involves teaching courses for the Departments of Geography-Geology and Politics & Government. He contributes to the field by reviewing manuscripts for publishers and geography journals. His new email is: mhemma2@ilstu.edu.

To say that **Dr. Bob Seidel** has retired (2004) from teaching is apparently something of a misleading statement. This spring he taught the Map Reading and Interpretation course for the Geography Department and a Global Physical Environment course for the Trio Programs this summer, as he has for the past eighteen years. We are pleased to share news with you from the following alumni:

Dr. Gary Johnson, '65, '66 returned to UND in 2002 as Executive Officer and Professor in the Upper Midwest Aerospace Consortium. He moved to the Office of the Vice President for Research in 2005 as Associate Vice President for Research and Co-Project Director of the ND Experimental Program to Stimulate Competitive Research (EPSCoR). Since February of 2007, he has additionally served as the Interim Vice President for Research. Johnson left UND as Chair of the Geography Department in 1976 following seven years on the faculty. In the intervening 26 years he worked for state and federal government, the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP), and aerospace contractors Hughes and Lockheed Martin. He also held adjunct faculty positions with South Dakota State University and the University of Missouri.
